

Congratulations to Fred for qualifying to compete in Crufts next year for the Agility Dog of the Year.

Fred first took an interest in dog agility when their 'naughty' family beagle was recommended obedience and agility classes to improve his behaviour by challenging him more.

Fred now competes with his 4 year old cocker spaniel George, completing a range of agility courses involving tunnels, jumps, frames and weaves. The aim of agility is to control your dog around the course in the quickest time making the least number of faults through verbal commands and arm signals. Fred won his qualifier round to Crufts by a clear 3 seconds. Since taking part in agility training Fred is now a qualified agility judge. This qualification involved passing a two-day course with a combination of theory and practical tests and he has completed his judging debut last month.



# Jemma Sargeant-Motocross

I started out riding two years ago with no real regard to limits. My first ride was on a PW80 riding around on kids tracks. The adventure started at Wild Tracks MX, quickly moving on to Washbrook farm, Foxborough Quarry, Rushmere, Besthorpe and Mildenhall. I learnt how to jump almost instantly until one ride set me back a bit. I was at Rushmere and went a little too far and flipped the bike on the landing.

After I had recovered, the next step was to move on to a bigger bike, so I ended up with a KX85. I hated it at first, getting used to the height and clutch. I soon made a similar mistake although this time it led to worse results: we were on the main track and I'd been riding all day, now losing the grip on the throttle. One more lap! One more lap! I kept saying to myself, but this pushed me into a place that I didn't want to be, I missed the landing and broke my hand. In that moment I knew I was coming off. As I landed the marshal ran to me and asked what hurt and the one thing I remember saying was "everything". They stopped the practice and the 4x4 picked me up from the track. After a 3 hour wait in A&E I discovered

I had broken two fingers and knuckles. They suggested a slab cast but went against it and left it to heal on its own. I couldn't ride for 4-6 weeks.

It was after this that we started going to races. Foxborough was first, I finished last by 1 second because I missed the transponder. Next was Hadham, this track is the worst of all. In my first race there I wasn't familiar with logs and bogs however in the second race there I improved on logs but not in bogs. In the second race I came 6th, losing places in the bog. SMCC had decided to let the adults do their three hour race first, resulting in deep ruts and slippery tree roots. Somehow I managed to get stuck on the sighting lap but still carried on and finished the race. The final race was at Tye Farm. This is the best track as it has no obstacles apart from a few off camber corners. I still managed to fall off on the first lap quickly becoming last. However I pushed up to get 7th overall.

# Paris








## Library

The Reading Agency have introduced Mischief Makers, Summer Reading Challenge 2018, celebrating the 80th anniversary of the much-loved comic Beano. Suffolk Libraries will be running the challenge in all libraries including Great Cornard, for children aged 4 to 12. Signing up will take place from Saturday 21st of July.

The Summer Reading Challenge helps to get ¾ million primary aged children nationwide into libraries during the summer holidays, when children's reading can otherwise dip, causing problems when they return to school. The number of children taking part in Suffolk has been increasing year on year since 2013. Last year 8,362 children took part in the county, supported by hundreds of volunteers.

43 Year 9 students and 4 teachers went to Belgium and France on the 28th and 29th June. We learnt what it was like to be a soldier during the First World War.

At 4am on Thursday morning we arrived at school and we headed to the Eurotunnel. We had a short drive into Belgium near to a town called Ypres. We went straight to a system of German trenches. We learnt about life in the trenches for the soldiers.

We then went to an English cemetery called Bedford House. We saw the bright colours, the English flowers, the bright white headstones and the way that we celebrate their lives. As a comparison we then went to a German cemetery where it was dark with oak trees and dark small, flat headstones. There were many German soldiers buried in each grave. We then visited Tyne Cot which is the biggest Commonwealth War Grave site in the world, which has incorporated some German bunkers into the layout. There is a huge wall of the names of the soldiers that have never been found.

We then went to a chocolate shop in Ypres before having dinner. By 8pm we were at the Menin Gate for the daily ceremony

to remember the fallen. Every night, since 1927, the traffic is stopped while the “Last Post” is played and some wreaths are laid. Three TGS students who had asked plenty of questions during the day were able to lay a wreath on behalf of TGS. We then left Ypres and went to our accommodation with just enough time for a game of football in the field before bed.

The next day we learnt about the Somme. We walked through some of the actual battle sites that the Pals Battalions had been in such as the “Sunken Lane”. We had a ‘show and tell’ with equipment and uniform to help us understand what the men had experienced. Our walk ended at Newfoundland Park where there were more trenches to walk through. We visited the Ulster Tower and learned a bit about the troubles in Ireland that had an impact at the same time as WW1, then onto the Lochnagar Crater. The crater is the site of a huge mine blast – the photos don’t really do it justice. We finished the day at Thiepval memorial.

The trip all together really opened up everyone’s eyes as to what the hundreds of thousands of men went through every day.

## We Come From Far, Far Away- Drama Trip

Inside the tent there is a smaller tent, and inside the smaller tent there is a boy. He has travelled a long way, mostly on his own. He can show you the things he has brought with him, he can tell you the reasons for his journey, he can tell you about the route he has taken but he can't tell you where the story ends ... Performed in a Mongolian yurt, the show follows the difficult and amazing journey of two boys who travel alone from Aleppo, Syria to Norway seeking refuge. Some Year 8s got the chance to go see a performance as part of the East Anglian Children's Arts Festival. Sybil Andrews hosted a play called 'We Come from Far, Far Away' performed by a group called NIE from Norway. It is a play based on refugees coming from Syria and making their way through Europe to safety in Norway. When we got there we were told to take our shoes off. There were two people playing instruments as we headed inside the yurt. When we

sat down on the floor of the yurt which was padded with cushions, they began. 'We Come from Far, Far Away' is a theatre production based on true stories shared by young refugees aged 13 - 18 yrs, who have arrived alone to seek asylum. The participants' stories are troublesome, but as with most young people, they are filled with energy, life and hope for the future.

The absolutely stunning performance used storytelling, shadow puppetry, comedy, clowning and live music to tell a big story in an intimate way. It was an amazing experience to go and see some international, professional drama. At the end they had a discussion about the play, we were allowed to ask and questions about the play because it meant that we could understand the parts which weren't as clear in the performance. It was great fun to go out and see some outstanding drama.

# Live streaming: protecting children from exploitation

## What is live streaming, why do young people do it and what are the risks?

In figures released today by children's charity Barnardo's, their new survey conducted by YouGov found that 57% of 12-year-olds and more than one-in-four children aged 10 (28%) have admitted to live streaming content over the Internet.

The figures also revealed that almost a quarter of 10 to 16 year-olds (24%) say they or a friend have regretted posting live content on apps and websites. But what is live streaming and what is the attraction?

### What is live streaming?

Live streaming is the broadcasting of live events as they happen, over the Internet, to a potentially unlimited audience base. Websites or apps can be used to live stream and, depending on particular preferences and settings, events can be broadcast to the world or a selected audience. Typically, mobile phones are used to live stream due to their portability and their built-in cameras, but webcams connected to laptops or computers can also be used.

### Why do young people live stream?

Being able to share news, an event, or an opinion with the world is particularly appealing to modern generations who have grown up with mobile technologies, and are used to being constantly connected. Inspired by online celebrity live streamers, young people may have a desire to share their lives online too and some want to follow in the steps of their online heroes.

Young people may live stream whilst they are playing games so that their audiences can watch and share in their experiences. They may broadcast a special event, such as a party, or they may just want to interact with strangers.

### What are the risks?

When broadcasting over the Internet, it's easy for young people to feel safe due to physical boundaries and this itself leads to increased vulnerability. People may attempt to trick, blackmail or coerce children during a time when their usual defences are down. This can lead to riskier behaviour. In cases of online grooming, predators have targeted children and used trickery and grooming techniques to get them to perform acts of a sexual nature in front of the camera. This is classified as a 'non-contact' abuse offence, but it is still sexual abuse.

Young people may not have an understanding of how the content they are broadcasting could be saved and shared further, and they may not know that people watching may not be who they say they are.

Recent research from the Internet Watch Foundation (IWF) found that children as young as three had exposed themselves online; that 96% of the victims were girls and that in almost all of the cases that they investigated, children were broadcasting from their home environments. ### Helping young people keep safe

It's imperative that all young people using online services have a good understanding of key online safety messages:

The importance of protecting their private information

The knowledge that people may pretend to be people they're not

The understanding that what they share online can be saved and shared by others

The knowledge of what to do if they are being bullied or coerced

The importance of asking for help if needed

It's also important that younger generations have a secure understanding of healthy relationships; that they shouldn't feel under pressure to act in a certain way, that no one has the right to ask them to do something that makes them feel uncomfortable and that their bodies are theirs.

On Wednesday 4th July we were very fortunate to have such an inspirational lady come into our sixth form assembly to give a presentation on how she has grown from living in such terrible living conditions to someone who has made a huge impact on other people's lives.

Glenda D Roberts grew up in a council estate in London with abusive alcoholic parents who told her she'd never succeed in life due to the colour of her skin. The place she lived was violent leading to a murder of her best friend. But what inspired me was no matter what was in her way (OCD, dyslexia, abusive household, the colour of her skin) she pushed all those factors out of the picture to proceed to her goal, she never let anyone's criticism or views change what she wanted to achieve including her own father.

I think something I have definitely taken from this talk is that you can have things thrown at you or bumps in the road, but you don't have to let them affect you or control you. Glenda had many career changes but after a racial attack on her brother which damaged his brain she became his carer which also led to an interest in the human brain itself. She is now a very successful psychotherapist and has received many awards for her outstanding achievements, Glenda now also runs a campaign called Just Talk (inspired by the suicide of her daughter's friend) where she offers drop in sessions to talk about anything that is concerning you, in a safe environment free of charge as well as counselling with professionals who can help people through tough situations like depression and anxiety.

I have certainly been inspired to focus more on what I need to succeed rather than let other things take control and not let me achieve my goals. She has also inspired me to reach out and put my own time into the community where needed.

Athletics has been a strong area for TGS this year with many athletes competing an age group higher and doing very well. This looks great for the future of athletics at TGS moving into the new academic year.




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## Millie's Team win Suffolk
